"After Jesus was born in Bethlehem in Judea, during the time of King Herod, Magi from the east came to Jerusalem and asked, 'Where is the one who has been born king of the Jews? We saw his star in the east and have come to worship him." --- Matthew 2: 1 & 2

While the three wisemen, or Magi, may have been extremely intelligent when it came to reading astrological signs, or matters more occult in nature, they seemingly didn't have a clue when it came to the workings of the human mind. King Herod was a fairly brutal man. He was feared, as most "kings" were back in those days, as being one who was not afraid to rule with an iron fist when necessary. He was also a puppet, pretty much, of the Roman Empire, doing things their way while enjoying a bit of autonomy in matters pertaining to local rule. As long as the tax money continued to flow into Roman coffers and the centurions had their run of the streets of the major towns in the Holy Land, King Herod was given free reign. That's why it is astounding that the wisemen decided to head straight to him and spill the beans on their mission from afar.

"Where is the one who has been born king of the Jews?" they ask, "We saw his star in the east and have come to worship him." Worship him? KING of the Jews? You mean MY subjects? We can almost hear King Herod's thoughts rattling around in his skull as he wears the precarious crown of kingship upon his head. We can be pretty sure that Herod was not thrilled.

Of course, if we have read the rest of Matthew chapter two we know what happens. Herod tries to trick the wisemen into returning to him and giving away the location of the Christ child so that he can have him... removed. When the wisemen are told in a dream (vs. 12) not to go back and make a report to Herod, Herod realizes he has been betrayed and goes on a rampage. Joseph is told in a dream to take Mary and the Baby Jesus and go hide out in Egypt (fulfilling scripture as he goes) when Herod comes rushing in to have all the babies two years old and under killed in the area where Jesus supposedly was (location leaked by the wisemen.) Brutal indeed.

January 6th is the holiday of Epiphany. It is the holiday that celebrates the arrival of the wisemen who then fall down before the Christ child and offer him the gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh before Herod puts his terrible plan into action. The word Epiphany comes from the Greek word epiphaneia which mean in English "appearance" or "manifestation." Remember, the New Testament was written mostly in the Greek language. Epiphany is a holiday that is wrapped in wonder and solemnity. The actions of the holiday fulfill scripture. We can also see that like most things that happen in the world, there is always a backstory, and that backstory can be one or turbulence, chaos, and sin.

Through it all we see God's will done in the world despite humanity trying to squelch it and choke it off. The power of prophecy is not so easily defeated, and one of the great ironies is that as Herod and others tried to derail God's will, they unwittingly fulfilled the ancient scriptures without even knowing it.

As we head into 2025 with all its surprises and events, may we see and direct the things that we say and do and pray that the love of God can be seen in them. We are the hands, feet, eyes, and ears of the Body of Christ. May we continue to love one another, in Christ, as we go about doing God's will.

Light overcomes darkness

January is a DARK month. As we start the month, we are still in the Christmas Season until Epiphany, January 6th. For most of us, we wake up in the dark, and by suppertime, it's dark again. On New Year's Day, the sun doesn't rise until 7:22 am and it sets by 4:42 pm. By January 31st, the days are only a bit longer, with the sun rising at 7:08 am and setting by 5:15. Some people find that depressing, and yet, it gives us opportunity to literally experience the scripture found in our Gospel reading for January 5th:

John 1:1-5 (NRSV)

¹ In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God.
² He was in the beginning with God. ³ All things came into being through him, and without him not one thing came into being. What has come into being ⁴ in him was life, and the life was the light of all people. ⁵ The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overcome it.

From a practical standpoint, I embrace the darkness of January...the Christmas season lasts until January 6th, so our Christmas decorations are still bright and shining. Imagine how washed-out the beautiful lights of Christmas would be if we still had LONG bright days like we do in Summer. The sparkling lights on the trees and houses would be practically invisible! So, I embrace the darkness. I hope your trees and lights are still shining too!

Of course, there's more to the light vs darkness struggle than simply how long the sun shines each day. The prophet Isaiah said it best:

Isaiah 9:2 (NRSV)

²" The people who walked in darkness have seen a great light; those who lived in a land of deep darkness— on them light has shined.

Of course, that GREAT LIGHT is Jesus, whose birth we just celebrated at Christmas and who's crucifixion we will mourn on Good Friday (April 18th this year) and whose glorious resurrection is celebrated on Easter (April 20th this year).

So, embrace the darkness in this winter season and perhaps use that time to find ways to make USE of the darkness as a way to grow closer to God. Celebrate and enjoy the remaining Christmas lights, perhaps use the "dark evening" time to read a devotional or some other good book...HEY, here's an idea...how about the BIBLE? It's the perfect month to live out the words in the last verse of the beloved Christmas Carol "In The Bleak Midwinter":

If I were a shepherd, I would bring a lamb:

if I were a wiseman, I would do my part; Yet what I can I give him, give my heart.

Since you can't PHYSICALLY give your heart, you CAN find ways to give. How about allocating some of your tax refund to your favorite charities? Maybe consider donating blood to help save a life? Maybe invite a friend or neighbor to come to church with you and enjoy a brunch with them after church? Maybe volunteer to be more active at church?
