"And now abide faith, hope and love, these three; but the greatest of these is love." --- 1 Corinthians 13: 13

February is the month in which we celebrate Valentine's Day. February 14th is the day of celebration complete with red hearts, hard candy with sayings on them like "Be Mine", and precious little cards that let us know whether we are loved, or at least liked, by whoever sent them. Steeped in initially religious meaning and experience due to the moniker of ST. Valentine who was a saint after all, over the years the holiday has taken on more romantic tones as it ties in with kisses and hugs and candy and the precious cards before mentioned. I don't necessarily think this is an "end-of-the-world" kind of thing, but it does awaken within me the need to once again describe the kind of love that Paul is writing about in our Lesson above, and the kind of love that St. Valentine was experiencing while he was serving his term in prison (hence the cards, the well-wishes and prayers, snuck in through the cell doors.) What can now be a flippant or trivial holiday has roots in a type of love that is much deeper than the "sweetheart" level, and that kind of love is very eloquently written about in 1 Corinthians 13.

"Love suffers long and is kind; love does not envy; love does

not parade itself; it is not puffed up; does not behave rudely, does not seek its own, is not provoked, thinks no evil; does not rejoice in iniquity; but rejoices in the truth; bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things. Love never fails." (1 Corinthians 13: 4 - 8.) When we read these words, we can immediately see that we are not talking about the typical Walgreen's greeting card Valentines Day kind of love. There is something almost sacrificial in this way of thinking about love, and that might make us quite uncomfortable. If we stop and think for a moment, though, it doesn't take us very long to realize that the essence of love is a kind of vulnerability in which we dare to care about another person and ponder the sense of being open to their thoughts and feelings. In Ephesians 5, when Paul talks about a proper kind of relationship between a husband and wife, the clumsy English word comes out as "submit" (both are called to submit to one another out of reverence for Christ), but the more eloquent Greek word in which the New Testament is mostly written means something closer to "be willing to put the interests of the other person first." There we go, back to the meaning of love that St. Valentine would have been more comfortable with, and the kind of love as Christians that we are called to share with one another in a more spiritual sense.

Valentine's Day can be a really fun holiday, and the 1 Corinthians version of love that we read about in the Bible might be a bit too heavy for the average person who celebrates the holiday, but it is good to keep in mind that this type of love is something that we can shoot for, we can TRY to get closer to it as we share life and experiences with one another. Ultimately, it is this very type of love that Jesus has for us, and that is a love worth celebrating as we contemplate his real, and deep love for us.

God is love!

Ash Wednesday is late this year. Lent doesn't start until March 5th, so what's happening in church this month? We're still in the "Sundays After Epiphany" season all month...and Epiphany is the season of LIGHT. What other "L" word comes to mind for February? LOVE of course! Even though Valentine's Day is not an actual "Church" holiday (more of a "Hallmark" holiday), celebrating LOVE is certainly proper for Christians. Why? Because GOD IS LOVE:

⁷ Beloved, let us love one another, because love is from God; everyone who loves is born of God and knows God. ⁸ Whoever does not love does not know God, for **God is love**. ⁹ God's love was revealed among us in this way: God sent his only Son into the world so that we might live through him. ¹⁰ In this is love, not that we loved God but that he loved us and sent his Son to be the atoning sacrifice for our sins. ¹¹ Beloved, since God loved us so much, we also ought to love one another. ¹² No one has ever seen God; if we love one another, God lives in us, and his love is perfected in us. ¹³ By this we know that we abide in him and he in us, because he has given us of his Spirit. ¹⁴ And we have seen and do testify that the Father has sent his Son as the Savior of the world. ¹⁵ God abides in those who confess that Jesus is the Son of God, and they abide in God. ¹⁶ So we have known and believe the love that God has for us. **God is love**, and those who abide in love abide in God, and God abides in them. ¹⁷ Love has been perfected among us in this: that we may have boldness on the day of judgment, because as he is, so are we in this world. ¹⁸ There is no fear in love, but perfect love casts out fear; for fear has to do with punishment, and whoever fears has not reached perfection in love. ¹⁹ We love because he first loved us. ²⁰ Those who say, "I love God," and hate their brothers or sisters, are liars; for those who do not love a brother or sister whom they have seen, cannot love God whom they have not seen. ²¹ The commandment we have from him is this: those who love God must love their brothers and sisters also. 1 John 4:7-21

We won't hear those verses read in church this year, BUT, on February 23rd, we WILL hear this in our Gospel Reading from Luke:

Jesus said: ²⁷ "But I say to you that listen, Love your enemies, do good to those who hate you, ²⁸ bless those who curse you, pray for those who abuse you. ²⁹ If anyone strikes you on the cheek, offer the other also; and from anyone who takes away your coat do not withhold even your shirt. ³⁰ Give to everyone who begs from you; and if anyone takes away your goods, do not ask for them again. ³¹ Do to others as you would have them do to you. ³² "If you love those who love you, what credit is that to you? For even sinners love those who love them...³⁵ But love your enemies, do good, and lend, expecting nothing in return. Your reward will be great...

So, there we have it. GOD IS LOVE; that sums it up in three simple words. As a child growing up, we often sang those three words because there was a nice song in our hymnal titled "Come

Let Us All Unite To Sing"...subtitled: GOD IS LOVE! I did some online checking, that song has appeared in 120 hymnals, going back over 100 years. I didn't find it in any Lutheran hymnals, but it did make a Methodist, a Presbyterian, several Salvation Army, many Gospel and Sunday School hymnals, and those of the Mennonite church where I grew up. Given the Gospel for February 23rd, I might have to teach this to the choir so we can sing it on that It would make a nice "Call to date. Worship". Here's a preview of the first verse; something to think about, not only on Valentine's Day but EVERY day:

Come, let us all unite to sing, God is love. Let heav'n and earth their praises bring, God is love.

Let ev'ry soul from sin awake, let ev'ry heart sweet music make, and sing with us for Jesus' sake, for God is love.

Refrain: God is love! God is love! Come, let us all unite to sing that God is love.

Martin Luther understood this concept, and said this in a sermon in 1682, almost as if he were designing the first Valentine's Day card:

"God himself is Love, and his being is nothing but pure love. Therefore if anyone wanted to draw and picture God in a telling way, he would have to draw a picture that showed nothing but Love, as though the divine nature were nothing but the intense fire and fervor of a love that has filled heaven and earth." Happy Valentine's Day to you all!
