"You are the salt of the earth. But if that salt should lose its taste, how can it be made salty? It's no longer good for anything but to be thrown out and trampled underfoot. You are the light of the world. A city situated on a hill cannot be hidden. No one lights a lamp and puts it under a basket, but rather on a lamp stand, and it gives light to all who are in the house. In the same way, let your light shine before others, so that they may see your good works and give glory to your Father in heaven."

--- Matthew 5: 13 - 16

Jesus is speaking with the above words from the Sermon on the Mount. If you have ever read that famous sermon, you would see that Jesus tackles all sorts of topics in a very short period of time (at least in so far as it takes you to read it.) One of those topics, which undergirds most all of the rest he says, is included above. Using salt and light as symbolic examples, Jesus is encouraging those listening to not tamp down the Spirit which lives within them. Salt and light are examples of the will of God that lives within us, that urge to do the right thing, to make a difference, and to stand up for that which is just and right instead of just rolling over and letting the ways of the world take their toll. Yes, even long ago, Jesus needed to prod the people into activity. He enjoined them to physically, mentally, and especially spiritually wake up and see what kind of day it was. Jesus' messages included in the Semon on the Mount are hard to accept and follow if we are all caught up in the ways of the world, and even if we are

life-long Christians, there is a very sharp burn of challenge in what he preaches. Jesus takes topics like poverty, the Law, murder, forgiveness, adultery, divorce, oath-taking, revenge, loving your enemies, the right way to give and donate, prayer, fasting, the proper place of possessions in our lives, anxiety and worry, judging others, being deliberate towards God, hypocrisy, and the importance of a rock-solid foundation and puts all of these things in one sermon. I would never attempt such a thing! And then he takes those topics and heightens them to a level that seems almost impossible to succeed at.

Why?

What Jesus knows is the peculiar nature of human nature. Jesus knows that if we start out at a lackluster level in just about anything, the most we will be able to realize as an end-goal is a lack-luster result. Mediocrity rules the day when expectations are low. This has been shown over and over again in world history. Instead, Jesus aims high, almost impossibly high, so that we as his followers are challenged, inspired, piqued, and wondering why we are living at the current level of blandness that we are. The master is prodding us so that we can aspire to great heights so that even if, and when, we fail we will have fallen farther "up the ladder" than if we had never been challenged in the first place.

The next time you feel that life is too tough, the next time that you tell yourself that God isn't fair and that things aren't going satisfactorily to your liking, just remember the Sermon on the Mount. Life is full of challenges, to be sure, and God doesn't promise us the "garden path" as we make our way through life's pitfalls. But what we are promised is that the Master will guide and direct us, and give us the strength to pull through it all, when we go to him. After all, he holds the keys of eternal life which extends far beyond the bounds of this world.

Aim high and get close to the mark. It will be better than if you had never been challenged in the first place.

March—In like a Lion, out like a Lamb

I know we've all heard that tired old saying a gazillion times, but this year, even our Sunday scripture lessons substantiate that idiom. How's that, you say?

Well, on the first Sunday of March, we hear of God's lion-like traits in each reading.

In the 1st reading, we hear the declaration of the ten commandments, and hear that we are NOT to bow down to idols and we must have NO OTHER Gods before God. "I am a jealous God, punishing children for the iniquity of their parents."

In the 2nd lesson, "The Lion" continues as we hear "I will destroy the wisdom of the wise and discernment of the discerning I will thwart."

In the Gospel, we hear the story of Jesus entering the temple like a roaring lion as he angrily clear the temple of the money-changers by overturning their tables and driving them out with whips. When the Jews confronted him, he roared "Destroy this temple, and in three days I will raise it up."

Yes, the "king of the beasts" lion comes out loud and clear as March comes in.

So, what changes that March goes "Out like a lamb"? Well, the last week of March is Holy Week, and March 31st is EASTER. In that final week, we "Behold the Lamb of God, who takes away the sins of the world." Christ, who died once for all our sins, gave up his life that we might live. He was the sacrificial lamb of atonement for us.

Holy Week starts on March 24 with **Palm Sunday** as we join in remembering our Lord's triumphant entrance into Jerusalem.

This year, we will once again offer Maundy Thursday services at 10:30 am and 7 pm on March 28th. This will allow those who work night shifts or don't like night-driving the opportunity to attend this historic and meaningful service where we remember Jesus first instituting Holy Communion for his closest followers. The two services are identical, except the choir will sing at the evening service. Come, share the experience leading to Jesus's arrest and trial for which he was crucified on Good Friday.
