

The angel said to the women, "Do not be afraid, for I know that you are looking for Jesus, who was crucified. He is not here; he has risen, just as he said. Come and see the place where he lay. Then go quickly and tell his disciples: 'He has risen from the dead and is going ahead of you to Galilee. There you will see him.' Now I have told you."

--- Matthew 28:5-7

How forgetful and contrary we can be! We wonder about something, someone gives us the answer, we are excited for a moment or three, and then we abruptly, or over the space of a little time forget the answer we were craving for so long and need to be told all over again. Such is the curse of the human mind.

Scripture tells us that Jesus tried to talk to his disciples THREE times about his death and resurrection. The third time we read that the disciples were so afraid of what they were hearing that not only did they not want to hear it, but they were afraid to ask Jesus questions. On and on they plodded to Jerusalem, dreading what might lie ahead. Maybe they thought if they didn't talk about it, it might not come true. We can be like that too when we say, "Shhh! You're gonna jinx us!" after someone says something we don't want to hear.

The passage above from Matthew is actually kind of funny if you think about it. Notice what the angel says as he begins to talk to the women about the fact that Christ is no longer in the tomb. "...he has risen, just as he said." Just as he said. One can almost hear the angel's tone of voice. "We've been over his before, but let's recap..." And it doesn't stop there! "He has risen from the dead and is going ahead of you to Galilee. There you will see him." The angel can't help it as the words are spoken, "Now I have told you." The angel feels the need to put that little qualification at the end. What could be the motivation be, after having told the women that Jesus is no longer there, of saying, "Now I have told you" other than to emphasize the importance of them realizing they have been told something that is *crucially* important. We do this occasionally when we say things like, "Are you listening to me?" "Did you hear what I said?" Of course, the person we are talking to has heard what we said. Their eardrums did vibrate as we talked. The question is, did their brain process it? Did the message sink home? One wonders how many times God has had to put up with people who didn't want to listen. It's interesting to note that Jesus says quite often things like, "...for those with ears to hear."

This year, April is the month in which we celebrate Easter. It can pop up in March, but this year we get to enjoy it in April. April is also the month in which we playfully celebrate April Fools Day. Unlike the disciples who had such a hard time hearing and then responding, let us celebrate Easter with confidence, wonder, and openness of heart. Let us not be foolish! Listen to what God is saying to you through the power of the empty tomb. Death has been defeated. Eternal life is ours! That is a message worth listening to!

Lent continues—OPEN your life!

Easter is late this year, so much of April remains in the season of Lent. It's not too late to come to the remaining Wednesday evening Lenten suppers and services. We're enjoying delicious soup and sandwich suppers at 5:45 each week, followed by very meaningful worship at 7 pm. We're using the theme "Open Your Life" and each week we've heard scriptures and sung songs related to how we can be open to God's will. Then, Pastor's dramatic presentations top things off nicely. Here's what's coming up:

Week 4 of Lent: Open My Heart, Lord

Listening to Paul's teaching, Lydia opened her heart to God and was baptized. Her willing, trusting faith echoes down through the centuries as we witness her "open heart procedure."

Week 5 of Lent: Open My Life, Lord

Moses presents us with a choice: death and adversity, or a life cracked open to the love of God. Writing to the Galatians, Paul tells us that we have died to the law so that we might live to God. It is no longer we who live, but Christ who lives in us.

Holy Week is coming...are you?

The Lenten season wraps up starting with PALM SUNDAY on April 13th. This is also confirmation day for our confirmands. On that day, we remember Jesus's triumphant entry into Jerusalem, when his followers cheered as he rode into town on a donkey. "BLESSED is He who comes in the name of the Lord!" they cheered...and yet, just 4 days later, they were cheering "CRUCIFY HIM". The services in that holiest of weeks recount the tragedy of those events and our worship goes from "HOSANNA" to music better fitting a funeral. Unfortunately, many people choose to avoid Maundy Thursday and Good Friday worship, opting to stay in that "happy" Palm Sunday mood until Easter Sunday, but in so doing, you're missing the emotion and meaning of the events of those fateful days. The beautiful and emotional music at the Maundy Thursday and Good Friday services remind us of the supreme sacrifice Jesus made for each of us. Don't skip those two important services! For those who should not be driving at night, we will offer communion services on Maundy Thursday (April 17th) at both 10:30 AM and 7 PM. The services are identical, except the choir sings at the evening service.

EASTER—April 20th!

After the seemingly long Lenten Season, the wondrous Easter Season arrives on April 20th. HE IS RISEN! HE IS RISEN INDEED we will shout as we pull out all the stops and sing the joyful songs of the resurrection. The liturgy songs will change back to ones of JOY as we bring "Hallelujah" out of hiding (we purposely avoid songs containing that word during Lent), and our weekly "hymn of praise" returns, with the appropriate words "This is the feast of VICTORY for our God, HAL-LELUJAH". Easter is actually a "season", not just one Sunday, so we'll be singing Easter-oriented songs until Pentecost, which is on June 8th this year.

If you're looking for a good time to invite your unchurched friends to join you in worship, the Easter Season is the perfect time. Everything is BRIGHT and the sanctuary should smell amazing with the fragrance of (hopefully) dozens of Easter Lilies. We'll have an Easter Egg hunt for the kids at 9:45 on Easter Sunday, and lots of coffee-and-donut fellowship for the adults between services. See you there!



Women's role in the Easter Story

We read a lot about the men in the Bible: The Apostles and the Disciples and prophets, but don't discount the important roles that women played in this story. It was an unnamed women who anointed Jesus with costly ointment for which he said her act was important because it prepared him for burial (Matt 26). In Matt 27, we read that there were many women at the crucifixion who had followed Jesus and had provided for him. On that first Easter Sunday, it was two women (Mary Magalene and "the other Mary") who first went to the tomb and were told by an angel that Jesus had been raised and they were told to "Go quickly and tell his disciples". Yes, it was the women who first preached the Gospel of the resurrection!
