May 2025

"Your word is a lamp to my feet and a light for my path. I have taken an oath and confirmed it, that I will follow your righteous laws. I have suffered much; preserve my life, O Lord, according to your word." Psalm 119: 105 - 107

May brings about the month of growth. Sure, April establishes vegetative growth as we can see in the phrase "April showers bring May flowers" but it is in the month of May that plants, flowers, vegetables, fruit trees, and such seem to really take root and push off in a more substantial way. What before may have been bare tree branches blowing in the cool early Springtime wind are suddenly transformed into thick and luscious forest swaths that hang lazily in a sultry, balmy heat. The death and loss of the previous Fall into Winter weather pattern, which stripped trees bare and leveled the soil to mud and snow have now given way to luscious, vibrant (albeit pollen and dust filled) greenery that spans as far as we can see. Trees and flowers have weathered the "suffering" of the declining late season of the year prior and now parade about in their Springtime garb awaiting another summer of living.

The verses printed above, penned by King David in a moment of great turmoil, himself unmoored in the wilderness, mirror the

changes that occur in our lives that we can see specifically in the turning of the seasons. Things are born, they are tried in a difficult world, they achieve their purpose and then suffer and change before they are once again born into the world for another go. We can see this in the lives of people, in the changing of the patterns of the seasons, in the history of humanity as it struggles with meaning and purpose in an uncertain age, and even in our own theological, faith-based struggles with God. David is telling us about his struggles with his faith considering his "banishment" to the wilderness because of the will of his son Absolom who desires to have him put to death. David has followed the will of the Lord by declaring to follow his word, while at the same time he admits to suffering, and resorts to pleading with God that his life be spared. Oh, how our lives mimic David's at times. We too declare our belief and faith in God and in his providence, while we also suffer from the wiles and dangers of the world. If you have ever been in the hospital as a result of physical hurt, suffered injury from an accident, misjudged a situation and had to pay the consequences to those who were hurt my your mistake, had to admit your fault for something, or recognized you may have "over-reacted" about something, all the while maintaining your belief in God, then you can sympathize with King David in the verse above. Here is a believer in the ways of the Lord who had to suffer in a broken world that doesn't seem to care. Just as the cold Fall rains and winds drive the tree leaves to death and lifeless piles on the ground, only to bud forth and be regrown again in the Spring on the bow, so too might we experience these types of stages in our lives.

The one constant is the power and wisdom of the Lord – the Lord's word. Through all of life's "ups and downs" may we also be led like David to an eventual future that reveals and fulfills God's will in our lives. "Your word is a lamp to my feet and a light for my path." Yea, Lord, let it be so!

EASTER!! He is RISEN...He is RISEN INDEED

Yes, EASTER finally arrived...April 20th this year. As always, we worked our way up to Easter with the 40 days of Lent (not including Sundays) and now, after a very meaningful and meditative Lenten Season, it's finally time to celebrate the resurrection!

Our Sunday Liturgy is back to FULL POWER! We can once again sing the joyous "Hymn of Praise" such as "This is the Feast", and include ALLELUIAs in our hymns! It's a time to rejoice and be exceedingly glad. In fact, those two words appear in the same sentences 75 times in the Bible, especially in the Psalms.

Easter is not just a "day", it's a season...50 days to be exact...starting on Easter Sunday and finishing 50 days later on Pentecost, which this year, will be on June 8th. The lessons in the Easter Season will be concentrating on Jesus preparing his followers to carry on his ministry. Here are some things we'll hear:

May 4th: The disciples make a big splash and eat breakfast with the risen Jesus. Wading in the water (remembering baptism) and eating with Jesus (celebrating holy communion) is our weekly encounter with the risen Christ. Jesus asks us again and again: Do you love me? And Jesus invites us, again and again, to follow him, bringing the Easter life to others.

May 11th: The gift of new life, of eternal life, is the gift of the risen Christ. It is the promise of Jesus. It was true for Dorcas in Joppa. It was true for those "who have come out of the great ordeal" in the Revelation vision. It is true for us and for all the baptized: Surely goodness and mercy shall follow me all the days of my life, and I will dwell in the house of the Lord forever.

May 18th: Easter initiates a new day. It anticipates a new heaven and a new earth. The risen Christ is making all things new. In the mystery of holy baptism God has made new people of us. Today Jesus invites us to see everyone in a new light—through the lens of love.

May 25th: Visions abound in the readings for the sixth Sunday of Easter. Paul has a vision about what to do. John has a vision of what will be. Jesus provides visions of peace that surpasses human understanding and power beyond human imagination.
