Pastor Michael's Musings

June 2022

As Jesus went on from there, he saw a man named Matthew sitting at the tax collector's booth. "Follow me," he told him, and Matthew got up and followed him. While Jesus was having dinner at Matthew's house, many tax collectors and "sinners" came and ate with him and his disciples. When the Pharisees saw this, they asked his disciples, "Why does your teacher eat with tax collectors and 'sinners'?" On hearing this, Jesus said, "It is not the healthy who need a doctor, but the sick. But go and learn what this means: 'I desire mercy, not sacrifice.' For I have not come to call the righteous, but sinners."

--- Matthew 9: 9 - 13

Do you notice who wrote the above passages? Yep. It was Matthew. Did you notice as you read it who was regarded as a "sinner"; the one who got the whole conversation rolling about whether Jesus was doing the right thing by stooping so low as to have anything to do with people not of his station? Yes, once again, it was Matthew.

Repeatedly in scripture we see God daring to stoop so low as to minister to those who the rest of the world would throw away. One might ask, "Who's got it right?" Is it God, who continues to make himself vulnerable to those who could potentially let him down, infusing them with a hope and a direction that they have never had before and just as easily fail at, or is it the world, who would seek to not

waste time on those who it knows are questionable and "high risk." Before we jump to an answer, perhaps we need to ask that question of ourselves, and put ourselves in the place of the "sinner." How would we like God to think of us and treat us?

What is notable in the passage from above is that even though Jesus eats with the tax collectors and sinners, he does not become one of them. Jesus calmly leads by example and, it can be safely assumed, through the spreading of the good word of the Gospel. Jesus's world view as the Savior does not exempt him, or cause him to shy away from conversation with those who he can see are plainly hurting whether in body, mind or spirit. Instead, his very identity as the Savior of the World motivates him to get in where the going is the toughest and tell people that there is another way to live life. What happens to all of these people that Jesus encounters? We will never know. The Bible cannot go into such detail as following the life story of every individual person Jesus leaves a lasting impression on. What we can do, though, is ponder the possibility that it might be that we, today, can enjoy the message of the Gospel because of something that one of these unnamed people did around 2,000 years ago.

Look again at Matthew. He is the one the scriptures point to initially as the one who needs to be saved, but yet ironically, it is his very book that tells us that. Indeed, when God invests time and energy into us through the Word, sacrament, and fellowship of the Christian community we find that such efforts can bear unforeseen and wonderful, positive results.

Sinners? Yes, that we name we can all live up to. It is whether we slink away in shame, as the world would have us do, or whether we see the continual invitation from God that can embolden and empower us, which is what the Bible would have our response be, that makes all of the difference.

Our summer worship will move OUTDOORS (weather permitting) starting SUNDAY JUNE 12th, This is the perfect opportunity to invite your unchurched friends and relatives to join you in our scenic shelter area at a very convenient time that doesn't get in the way of luncheon and afternoon events! <u>COMMUNION?</u> YES - we will have communion every week, using small disposable plastic "chalices". Pastor will lead us as we all take the body and blood together at his command.

SUNDAY SCHOOL? Yes, Sunday School starts at 10:15 (inside).



Pentecost - June 5

Our final Sunday indoors will be June 5th, which is Pentecost Sunday! This will be the final appearance of the choir for the season, and a chance to "pull out all the stops" with joyful music on the organ.


Contrary to popular misbelief, Pentecost was not a "new holiday" in Jesus' time. In fact, historians tell us that the Jewish people had a festival celebrated as the Feast of Weeks (Shavuot in Hebrew), which was celebrated each year first as a day of thanksgiving for the firstfruits of the harvest, and later, in remembrance of Moses receiving the Law on Mt. Sinai. Jesus and his followers were "in town" on that day to celebrate the feast, when the Holy Spirit descended, which of course, set the stage for how we celebrate today. You see MANY Old Testament references to the Spirit, starting as early as Genesis 1:2.

Pentecost marks the end of the "Easter Season", so our Sunday liturgy will change musically to reflect the change. We will once again use the popular more-contemporary setting we've used in recent summer months. You may have noticed that the "Brief Order of Confession" has not been used during the Easter Season. That is to amplify the difference between the season of LENT (sinfulness and forgiveness) and EASTER (Redemption is OURS through the death and resurrection of Christ). We will once again start our services with the Brief Order of Confession on Trinity Sunday (June 12th).

So—remember PENTECOST is a FES-TIVAL service. We invite everyone to WEAR SOMETHING RED if possible, as red is the color of Festival Worship and reminding us of the Spirit descending as "tongues of fire" on the disciples.

Once again, our Evangelism Committee will present all our guys with something special on Father's Day. We want everyone to know the importance of Christian Dads (and Grandpas and Uncles and Stepdads and more), so come to church on June 19th and accept a small token of our appreciation for all you do to set an example of Godly living for children of all ages.


