I don't expect you to remember any of that but suffice it to say that I have a bookshelf full of unfinished books that I have joyfully started and have never finished. I'm sure a psychologist could have a field day with that little bit of information. It more than likely says something about how my brain works.

New beginnings! I love the intensity, sparkle, and brightness of meeting new people, beginning new adventures, and discovering new vistas. Once I experience something and enjoy it I am quite loyal and am extremely reluctant to let it go. I am not a "change for changes sake" junkie, for the record. My desire for newness is not about change as much as it is about the joy of discovery and new possibilities. John talks about beginnings in the scripture lesson printed above; the beginnings that abide in us. Abide means "live" in us. The Good News of Jesus Christ is not a story to be read and then, upon completion, discarded and put on the shelf to collect dust. There is no end to it. The story of the abiding love that God has for us stretches into eternity. In asking this question we show that God's love abides in us. May you draw close to that which you have heard from the beginning, and feel no shame, for God's love covers you.

Well, as I write this, we've just enjoyed our first outdoor worship of the season. Yes, it got a bit "rainy" towards the end, but I was impressed by people's willingness to cope. Some came ready with umbrellas, which they opened as needed. Others picked up their chairs and moved under the shelter of the large shade trees, and others simply stayed stoic and held their ground! All in all, that shows that our congregation has the ability to adapt and deal with situations as they arise, and that's a GOOD THING! Last year, we worshipped all summer with NO rain-outs, so hopefully we can continue that this year, but if not, the sanctuary is just a few feet away, cool, dry, and ready to provide us a setting for worship!

Summer outdoor worship is a GREAT way to evangelize, and the 9 am time-frame is perfect for those wanting more time to relax and enjoy summer after church. I encourage you to tell your friends, neighbors, and unchurched relatives about what we offer and invite them to come with you and see for themselves! We will remain outdoors until at least mid-September (weather permitting).

The outdoor services are usually 10-15 minutes shorter than indoor worship because of the way we serve communion, so again, God is praised, we are nourished by word and sacrament, and it gives you a chance to meet members you might not otherwise see, because they normally attend a different service (8 or 10:30) than you do. It's a win-win for everyone!

The music tends to be a bit more "gospel/praise" oriented since it's all played on piano (with Pastor occasionally joining in on Guitar). Of course, as organist, I miss the power and richness of playing the organ, but all-in-all, it's a chance to enjoy praising God in a less formal setting that works well in the summer.

SO, I look forward to seeing you each Sunday, amidst the beauty of God's creation as we live out the familiar hymn "This is my Father's World".

Since I mentioned this familiar hymn on Page 1, I thought I'd give more details about it. It was written by Malthie D. Babcock (1858-1901), said to have been a "handsome and popular" Presbyterian minister. He used to leave his home for an early morning walk up a hill overlooking Lake Ontario, saying, "I am going out to see my Father's world." The hymn text is one of the finest nature hymns and is enhanced by Franklin Sheppard's arrangement of an English folk tune. In case you weren't in church when we last sang it, here are the uplifting words:

- 1 This is my Father's world, and to my list'ning ears all nature sings, and round me rings the music of the spheres.
 This is my Father's world;
 I rest me in the thought of rocks and trees, of skies and seas; his hand the wonders wrought.
- 2 This is my Father's world; the birds their carols raise; the morning light, the lily white, declare their maker's praise. This is my Father's world; he shines in all that's fair. In the rustling grass I hear him pass; he speaks to me ev'rywhere.
- 3 This is my Father's world;
 oh, let me not forget
 that, though the wrong seems oft so
 strong,
 God is the ruler yet.
 This is my Father's world;
 why should my heart be sad?
 The Lord is king, let heaven ring;
 God reigns, let earth be glad!




