**August 2022**

“Why, O Lord, do you stand far off? Why do you hide yourself in times of trouble... Arise, Lord! Lift up your hand, O God. Do not forget the helpless... But you, O God, do see trouble and grief; you consider it to take it in hand. The victim commits himself to you, you are the helper of the fatherless.”

--- Psalm 10: 1, 12, 14

Psalm 10 is written in the midst of horror and turmoil in King David's life. His son, Absalom, has listened to extremely unwise and very greedy counselors who have encouraged him to depose his father and take the throne. Part of the deposing would be to have King David killed. Blessedly, King David learns of his son's attempt to dethrone him, escapes Jerusalem just in time, and heads out into the wilderness with his still-loyal “mighty men.” A lot of suffering, anger, doubt and continual faith and praise will pour forth from David's pen as he then sits down in the midst of this terrible betrayal and writes the majority of the early Psalms which we now have to cherish and enjoy.

Isn't it interesting how some of the most beautiful, thought provoking, and life-changing pieces of art and literature come from the most dire times and places in a person's life? It seems to be part of the human condition.

You and I have our share of difficulties. We are no different than anyone else. Unless you've been blessed to have lived the “perfect life” so far, when you look back on your hardships you can probably point to something that upon retrospection was redeeming and necessary in your life's journey. Usually that experience comes with the way that someone else treated us, nurtured us, and stepped up to the plate when we couldn't. Perhaps we learned that we are

tougher than we thought. Something that would have crippled us at another time in our lives, or would have decimated other people that we know, was a terrible ordeal to be sure, but from somewhere we were able to pull enough grit and courage out of the bag to keep us going. Once again, the human condition seems to point us to the uncomfortable, to downright horrific, times in our lives as being the most productive or the most knowledge-inducing we will ever experience. It is in the times of plenty and celebration that we tend to be the most casual and trivial. Time can pass swiftly as we coast through life with little meaning.

In Psalm 10, printed above, we see David pouring his heart out to God who seems to be ignoring him, or worse yet, aiding in his downfall. The God who described David as “the apple of his eye” in Psalm 10 seems to have forgotten anything he ever said leaving David to fend for himself. And think of the horrific nature of the struggle! Being betrayed unto death by one’s own son; that is the “valley of the shadow of death” that David must endure. Yet David knows, and it proves to be true, that God does see trouble and grief and takes it in hand. The good news for David is that Absalom is eventually defeated (in a most shameful way) and David is restored to his throne and blessed many-fold for his faithfulness. But this does not come without grief. Even though his son tried to kill him and depose him, when David hears of Absalom’s death he spirals into a depression and mourns and cries for his lost son. Sometimes even in the blessing there can be a twinge of pain. Such is life in this world that needs to be redeemed.

The Good News is that we have a savior in Jesus Christ, descendant of David, who walks with us during the times of trial and does not, ultimately, let us come to destruction. We also have the day of the resurrection as our future in which life will spring anew as we are remade and raised in new spiritual bodies (1 Corinthians 15.) As we face trouble and struggle, we are ultimately the victors because of the Savior who makes us victorious through his grace. May we remember that as we continue to face life’s troubles and struggles. Jesus is the lord of peace, love, healing, and ultimately, eternal redemption.

Fortunately, through the power of computers and the ELCA's "Sundays and Seasons" web site, I was able to do a SEARCH for the word "summer", and it quickly found four "hits", only one of which we've ever sung. I might have to sing the others with Pastor:

ELW 733, "Great is Thy Faithfulness", says this in verse two:

*Summer and winter and springtime and harvest,  
sun, moon, and stars in their courses above  
join with all nature in manifold witness to thy great faithfulness, mercy, and love.*

ELW 829, "Have You Thanked The Lord?" The second verse is:

*Hallelujah! Paradise we taste where we are;  
summer breezes, winter warmth are never far.  
God's love is ever on display: have you thanked the Lord today?*

ELW 690, "We Raise Our Hands To You, O Lord" and in verse four we see:

*As summer follows springtime's rain, grace follows sorrow, and  
grief and joy shall bear much fruit, though hidden from our human eyes.*

ELW 833, "O That I Had A Thousand Voices" has this for the third verse:

*You forest leaves so green and tender that dance for joy in summer air,  
you meadow grasses, bright and slender, you flow'rs so fragrant and so fair,  
you live to show forth praise alone. Join me to make God's glory known!*
