### **Pastor Michael's Musings**

Then the Lord replied, "Write down the revelation and make it plain on tablets so that the herald may run with it. For the revelation awaits an appointed time; it speaks of the end and will not prove false. Though it linger, wait for it; it will certainly come and will not delay." --- Habakkuk 2: 2 & 3

Habakkuk is a book that we rarely read or preach from. It is due to the fact that the book of Habakkuk, most likely written during the reign of a very wicked Hebrew king named Josiah, tells of impending doom for the nation of Judah (southern Israel.) God's people have sinned unrelentingly for decades. They have ignored the warnings of the prophets that were sent to them and continue to be wicked like the pagan nations all around them. Although they are the people of Abraham, Isaac and Jacob, their actions and culture have strayed far from any kind of understanding as God has laid out for them in the Law. Habakkuk is one of the prophets who receive a vision of total destruction for the nation of Judah. Most likely written in the time frame of 640 - 609 B.C. the stage is set for the conquering and ferocious Babylonians to come in and lay waste. Habakkuk is confronted with a problem, and the book that he writes describes and interesting back and forth between him and God as Habakkuk tries to understand how God can allow the destruction of his very own people. Indeed, God will use the Babylonians as "His rod of judgement" and Habakkuk is troubled because he cannot understand how God could use a nation of people, the Babylonians, who are far more corrupt and evil than Judah is. Such is the quandary. But there is hope and God soon illuminates the dark future, if not to Habakkuk's liking, at least to his understanding.

The answer comes in the second chapter. Habakkuk 2: 4, "Behold the proud, His soul is not upright in him; But the just shall live by faith." In spite of the

coming condemnation, in spite of the swiftly arriving turmoil, in spite of the great terror and vengeance that is surely on the horizon, God reminds Habakkuk, and thus all of us, that if we are just, we shall live by faith. God is reminding Habakkuk that the answer to life's dilemmas and downfall is not to be placed in human hands. As battle and suffering rage all around, God reminds his people to continue to put their trust in him. Yes, for their sin, and the countless warnings they have chosen to ignore, the nation of Judah will suffer and be scattered. It is indeed a terrible (to inspire terror) prophecy. But in the verses above, God promises the people a revelation and tells the people to trust it and to run with it. "...the revelation awaits an appointed time...Though it linger, wait for it; it will certainly come and will not delay."

In Jesus Christ, Paul writes in 2 Corinthians 6:2, "Now is the appointed time, now is the day of salvation." Jesus brings salvation to all people who have ears to hear and who respond to his call for peace and love. Ironically, in the midst of this message, there is yet another occupier and conquering empire over the Israelites, the people of the Holy Land, and that is the power of Rome. For those who are still fixated on a Messiah who brings worldly power and physical coercion to the world, there is still disappointment and mockery. But at the time of the writing of 2 Corinthians, the power of Babylon is but the substance of dust and despair, and has been since 539 B.C., for nearly 600 years! The Babylon that conquered Judah in Habakkuk lasted less than 100 years in its entirety, which is as nothing compared to the nations all around it. When Habakkuk wrote that God was using Babylon as a "rod of judgment" he was right on the mark. Babylon's inherent wickedness brought about its early destruction. Rife with violence and self-destructive rot, Babylon could not help but be the "house-divided" that fell apart by its own weight. Internal weakness (King Nebuchadnezzar was insane and cropped grass like a cow we are told in the book of Daniel) drew the attention of jealous and hateful neighbors who then came in and destroyed Babylon in short order. King Cyrus of Persia couldn't wait! The revelation of Jesus Christ, on the other hand, did wait for an appointed time, and defied the vagaries of time that destroyed so many others. The fulfillment of the revelation did indeed come, and the Gospels and the Apostles tell of it. The revelation perseveres to this day over 2,000 years later.

"The just shall live by faith." Maintain and hold your faith in the revelation of Jesus Christ. It is the one message that will not fall by the wayside of the passing of time.

### We will all be changed!

### **1 Corinthians 15:51-52 (NRSV)**

<sup>51</sup> "Listen, I will tell you a mystery! We will not all die, but we will all be changed, <sup>52</sup> in a moment, in the twinkling of an eye, at the last trumpet. For the trumpet will sound, and the dead will be raised imperishable, and we will be changed."

I imagine many of you grew up hearing these verses read in church or Sunday Sunday. In many cases, you will hear it quoted at funerals or in sermons dealing with the "end times". Well, for me, the "twinking of an eye" came about noon on Friday July 12 as I was undergoing a cardiac catheterization (angiogram) to investigate potentially blocked blood flow to my heart. I assumed they would find something, insert a couple shunts, and after a few days of recuperation, I'd be "good as new". What I heard instead was that I had three blockages that could NOT be fixed with shunts. One was 65%, one was 90%, and one was 100%. I heard my cardiologist say that I was to be transferred IMMEDIATE-LY to the cardiac ICU (*Do not pass GO, do not collect \$200*) and expect open heart surgery first thing the next morning. Wow—I didn't hear any trumpets, but it certainly hit me in the "twinkling of an eye".

So—long-story-short, I survived the long 8 hour surgery, and could consider myself as to have died, seeing as how they had to put me on bypass and literally stop my heart to do the surgery, so I in many ways, I was in fact raised "imperishable" and I know for sure I have been "changed". I came back to the ICU wearing enough drains, monitors, IVs, and tubes to deplete the inventory of hardware at any Harbor Freight. I can't lift or push or pull ANYTHING more than the weight of a gallon of milk for at LEAST 2 months, and I'm doing daily exercises to regain breathing capacity and muscle strength. EVERYTHING wears me out at this point...so we'll be worshipping "on line" for at least a couple weeks at our "vacation church" which live-streams their services. I'm using the church as my "exercise track" because I can use my walker to go from the altar steps to the Sunday School restrooms over and over and rack up exercise miles (walkers just don't perform well on grass, gravel, or uneven sidewalks). I hope to be able to resume driving in early August, and I am eternally thankful that Alice Lopez is in good health and able to jump in for Sunday services, and to John Wetterauer for helping set up the outdoor piano (I'll need that assistance too, if I'm able to return in August).

The outpouring of prayers and greetings from you folks has truly been a blessing! I feel the love of God and the strength it's giving me. Recovery will be SLOW (and often painful), but I shall return as soon as possible. I might be CHANGED, but I'm not dead yet!

This WAS to happen on Sunday, Septenber 8th 2024, but due to my post-surgery recovery, unfortunately, we MUST CANCEL it at this time. It's possible (but probably unlikely) that I can get in shape to put on the service in late October, but playing the accordion includes three major activities/exercises that are currently *VER-BOTEN!* until my heart and lungs are back to normal.

### **CHOIR** returns in September

Our adult "Gospel Choir" should resume rehearsals on Thursday evenings at 7 pm starting September 5th, assuming my health is up for the challenge.
