Pastor Michael's Musings

November 2024

"We give thanks to you, O God, we give thanks, for your Name is near; men tell of your wonderful deeds. You say, 'I choose the appointed time; it is I who judge uprightly. When the earth and all its people quake, it is I who hold its pillars firm."

November is the month in which we celebrate the holiday of Thanksgiving. Our minds hover around the Thanksgiving table; we picture the hot turkey, the succulent dressing, the savory mashed potatoes and gravy, the candied yams, the pumpkin pie, the relishes and extras that make everything so festive and fun. We think in terms of earthly colors; orange, brown, yellow, and red. It is the time to celebrate the harvest and all that the Lord has done for us throughout the summer months, sending the rain and the sun and the breeze to ripen and mature the crops in the fields. The corn and beans are ripened, dried, harvested and safe inside of the silos, or bound for the markets for which they are intended. Thanksgiving is a wonderful time to celebrate the things that we are blessed with and remember the God above who makes it all possible. And this is good and right. Our Psalm above reinforces this spirit of thankfulness, but it also directs our thinking in another direction that might encourage us to have a more relational experience with God, with the Father above.

Psalm 75 assumes that there will be difficulty and challenge amidst all the celebration and thankfulness. "When the earth and all of its people quake..." reminds us that things like hurricanes, tornados, floods, and even

human wrought violence can be expected in this imperfect world that is yet to be redeemed. We might feel the earth quaking underneath our feet, the very foundation of our lives giving way, in which all that we have come to count on, is chiseled away at or comes to a crashing halt. The people in Asheville, North Carolina, I'm sure, were surprised and shocked to see the floodwaters of a hurricane washing away all they had ever known in their lifetimes. Those folks, and thousands of others, undoubtedly felt that the earth was figuratively quaking beneath their feet. For those of us who live in Illinois, on one of the greatest fault-lines in the world (New Madrid), we must make sure that we do not become too careless, hubris-filled, and complacent to forget that we also live in an area of potential catastrophe. Keeping a sense of community, what Thanksgiving is all about, is important for all people everywhere. We are promised that the Lord holds the earth's pillars firm in the Psalm above, and we have seen that it is the faith communities, those that work the will of God through helping others, that are able to get in quickly, in the case of Asheville and other sites of catastrophe and make a difference in the early hours of recovery.

On Thanksgiving, be thankful for all the food and other sensory blessings that will adorn your table. They are a gift from God, a gift that others this year might not be able to take part in. Be thankful for the people, the community around you, whether it is family or friends, who sit around your table in your home or at the table of Holy Communion when you gather in church. They also are a blessing.

"...it is I who hold its pillars firm," writes David, the Psalmist, about the living God who blesses, renews, and protects us day after day. This season continue to remember that Living Lord. Give thanks for all the blessings he so richly bestows.

What are you thankful for?

THANKSGIVING...the quintessential holiday devoted to food, family, football and "Black Friday" bargains. At least, that seems to be the case in many households. BUT WAIT! Is that what it's SUPPOSED to be about? I don't think so. The very name of the holiday suggests a more important purpose....THANKSGIVING...to GIVE THANKS! To whom? To whoever cooked that delicious dinner (well, for sure, but there's more)....to your favorite football team (what if they lose?) To Cable TV for broadcasting more games than you can possibly watch? To Big-Box stores like Walmart for being open for your shopping convenience, thus preventing their employees from enjoying the holiday with THEIR families? Hmmm...something tells me this isn't how it's supposed to be. I seem to recall some advice that I saw "someplace":

- O give thanks to the LORD, call on his name, make known his deeds among the peoples. 1 Chronicles 16:8
- O give thanks to the LORD, for he is good; for his steadfast love endures forever.
 1 Chronicles 16:34
- And now, our God, we give thanks to you and praise your glorious name. 1 Chronicles 29:13
- I will give thanks to the LORD with my whole heart; I will tell of all your wonderful deeds.
 Psalm 9:1
- ✤ Sing praises to the LORD, O you his faithful ones, and give thanks to his holy name.
 Psalm 30:4
- With a freewill offering I will sacrifice to you; I will give thanks to your name, O LORD, for it is good. Psalm 54:6
- It is good to give thanks to the LORD, to sing praises to your name, O Most High; Psalm 92:1
- Enter his gates with thanksgiving, and his courts with praise. Give thanks to him, bless his name. Psalm 100:4

Yes, that's where I saw it...in the Bible. If at ALL possible, I urge you to try to celebrate the holiday (a word derived from HOLY day) by giving THANKS to the Lord from whom all blessings flow. If possible, consider attending the community Thanksgiving Eve service (watch for details on where that will be this year), and otherwise, at least perhaps spend a moment in silent (or spoken prayer) before chowing down on that delicious repast that someone lovingly prepared. Recent events in my life have made me acutely aware of how blessed I am to be alive and able to enjoy a loving family and church friends. Look around, you too have much for which to give thanks!

Who is a saint?

The first Sunday of November is "All Saint's Sunday". In the early church, saints were "special", requiring a specific set of qualifications to be deemed "A Saint". You may have heard that so-andso is the "patron saint of xxxx". Martin Luther rejected that concept. We do not pray to "saints", we do not venerate them because we are ALL Saints. Luther said "Just as we should not deny that we are baptized and Christians, so we should not deny or doubt that we are holy We are all saints, and cursed is he who does not want to call himself a To be intent on separating the saint. saints from us...is to dishonor God's grace."

So, if are not to think of certain "saints" as "more holy" than we are, what do we do. Luther says "Next to Holy Scripture there certainly is no more useful book for Christendom then that of the lives of the saints." Why? Because by looking at what other saints have done (and are doing), we can be inspired to acknowledge OUR saintliness and remember we are called to be servants (saints) to others.

We light candles on All Saint's Sunday to honor the memory of the saints who have touched our lives with their devotion to God. Let that remind us that WE TOO are saints...let's live and serve accordingly.


