"While they were there, the time came for the baby to be born, and she gave birth to her firstborn, a son. She wrapped him in clothes and placed him in manger, because there was no room for them at the inn."

--- Luke 2: 6 & 7

Every year we read these lines of the virgin birth that took place in Bethlehem, the "City of Bread." (That's what Bethlehem means in Hebrew.) We read of the hurried and harried Mary and Joseph, forced to leave their actual home in Nazareth, in order to fulfill some sort of governmental decree (the taking of the census) quite apart from their will. "While they were there, the time came for the baby to be born," we read. Hardly a desirable condition for a woman to be in while on the road. Pregnancy and birth are hard enough without the grievous inconvenience of travel. And then the crowning insult – the sour icing on the stressful cake, "...there was no room for them at the inn." One can only imagine the stress and frustration of this young couple and their new baby "on-the-way."

We've all been there before. We all have stories and accounts from our past where we found things going from bad to worse. It just keeps getting more hurried and harried and chaotic. Yet, there is a silver lining and a valuable lesson in what we read in the nativity account. That message dawns on us when we begin to understand that God works in our lives through all conditions and predicaments, not just when things are good and predictable. A lot of the hymns that we sing were written in times of strife

for the author and for the nation they lived in. King David wrote the beauty of the Psalms when he was in the wilderness hiding from his son Absalom who was trying to kill him for the throne. It is unfortunate, but necessary to experience the downs of life, for sometimes they bring out the best in us when we struggle against them; when we come to ponder our place in the great and wide world, complete with God's Kingdom.

The Nativity story is astounding in that it brings together an extremely unlikely cast of characters who witness the incredible and wonderful. The shepherds, the equivalent of today's minimum wage workers, doing the work that most other people would not have wanted to do, the wise men, foreigners who studied and practiced divination and astrology, perhaps even worshipping other gods, on their way to the true God in Jesus Christ. The unhelpful innkeeper, the animals who were not even aware of the one who they were sharing a manger and stall with, even the angels, alien and pristine in the sky as they trumpeted down the glory of the Lord in their magnificent celestial music; all of these characters who came to the Nativity scene (yes, I know the wisemen came later on) with wonder and mystery in their hearts, minds full of questions, all are part of this story in that they lived out life on that special day. The world spun around them in all its glory for the King of Kings and Lord of Lords had arrived in the form of a vulnerable baby.

As you experience this Christmas Season, do not forget the blessing that is the people all about you. Yes, they come frustrated, worried, anxious and wondering, but they also bear the gift of being created in the image of God in their hearts and spirits and have a place in the plan of the Almighty. Jump in, get involved, experience the Christmas Season all over again. The blessings of the Christ child await.

Baby Jesus Available Upon Purchase

Christmas is coming...everyone is decorating! Most Christians have some sort of Nativity set in their displays. We recently went to Tanner's Orchard for a quick escape from reality. Their large display of gift items included a magnificent collection of gorgeous and unique nativity sets. Needless to say, they were priced accordingly to match their beauty and quality. However, I noticed that NONE of the sets included the star of the show: Baby Jesus. A closer look revealed a sign with each set saying "Baby Jesus Available Upon Purchase". Apparently, it has become popular to steal little Jesus figurines from Nativity sets in stores. Can you imagine that? WHY would people start doing that? What's the reason? What's the thrill? Where is Baby Jesus?

I don't know the answer to that, but I know that over 2000 years ago, shepherds were also looking for the answer to that question. On Christmas Eve, we'll hear the Gospel of St. Luke repeating those familiar words spoken to the shepherds by an angel who said, "This will be a sign for you: you will find a child wrapped in bands of cloth and lying in a manger." (Luke 2:12). In a manger, a barn! Well, the gift shop at Tanners isn't really a barn, but they DO have farm animals in their petting area, so perhaps people should look there for their baby Jesus figures, right? NOPE, he isn't there either. So where is Jesus today? Well, the ceramic ones are safely stored away at Tanners, but for Christians, we say that Jesus lives in our hearts. Through Baptism and Confirmation and Sermons and Sunday School lessons, we've all learned how and where to find Jesus, but he's no longer a Baby (the choir once sang an anthem by that title)...he lived and preached and taught and died and rose again. Christmas is just the beginning. In fact, he's COMING AGAIN, at a time yet-to be-revealed. So, we should remember that Christmas shows us that God loved us SO MUCH that he gave us the perfect gift: his son. Maybe we can remember that as we mull over what to buy as Christmas gifts for others. Some people just want to be loved, which means more than all the "stuff" in the world. I hope we all find time to reflect on what Christmas really means as the sacred night approaches.

Happy New Year!

Maybe I should say "Happy liturgical year!" Calendars are human inventions to help us keep track of times and dates, Without calendars, how would we remember birthdays and appointments and festivals? But all calendars are NOT created equal. Case in point: When is NEW YEARS? If you said January 1st, I'd reply "Yes, that is ONE new year...but it's not the ONLY new year". We in North America and Europe use the Gregorian Calendar, invented in 1582 (100 years AFTER Luther was born). In many Asian countries, they use a LU-NAR-based calendar, in which "New Years" appears on a variety of dates on In 2025, the "Chinese our calendar. New Year" will happen on January 29th, 2025. Our Jewish friends find that their holidays are determined by the Julian (Hebrew) Calendar, which is also primarily based on the LUNAR cycles as opposed to our SOLAR based calendar. For Jewish people, New Years already happened on October 2, 2024. what's this "liturgical" calendar? simply a way the church marches through the seasons. We START with ADVENT (4 Sundays before Christmas), followed by CHRISTMAS, then EPIPH-ANY (the season of light), then LENT (40 days before Easter...not including Sundays), then EASTER, then PENTE-COST, and then the long season of the Sundays after Pentecost. We use that calendar to schedule festival days and important seasons like Lent. So, as of December 1st, I say to you, "HAPPY NEW YEAR". Come to church...celebrate.

Christmas Eve Worship

We will once again have TWO opportunities to worship the newborn savior on Christmas Eve. The services will be at 4 pm and 6:30 pm. NOTE that the start time of the 2nd service is 1/2 hour LAT-ER than in past years, which will prove more convenient for everyone involved. The services are in a "Lessons and Carols" format, which means you'll hear lot of short Bible readings followed by the opportunity to sing MANY of the familiar and beloved Christmas Carols between readings. Of course, both services will end with the beautiful candlelighting, and we will have special music at both services. Invite your friends. Bring your out-of-town visiting relatives and worship together on this most holy night!
